MEMORIAL'S NEW PASTOR, REV. TRACY EVANS BIOGRAPHICAL INFORMATION

The Reverend Tracy Lyn Evans has been ordained to the ministry of Word and Sacrament since 1997. She is a native Oklahoman, raised in Oklahoma City and Edmond. She is a graduate of Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary (M.Div) and University of Central Oklahoma (B.S. in Elem. Ed.).

After seminary, Tracy was a resident chaplain at the OU Health Sciences Center. Following the Oklahoma City Murrah Building bombing, she worked as Disaster Response Coordinator for the Presbytery of Indian Nations. She served as Associate Pastor at the Presbyterian Church of Bella Vista, Arkansas and has worked on the staff at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Oklahoma City. Most recently, she has been the interim pastor at First Presbyterian Church of Duncan, Oklahoma since 2009. She has lived in Arkansas, California, Texas and Oklahoma.

A life-long Presbyterian, she has served the church in many capacities, including serving on the Advisory Committee to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance for the PC(USA), the Committee on Ministry in Indian Nations Presbytery and Congregational Care and Development in Arkansas. This summer she will be a commissioner to the General Assembly of the PC(USA).

By her own admission, she watches too much TV. She loves to knit, quilt, craft and bake, and is at home with her chocolate lab Lily and cats Maizie and Lucy Jane. She loves to travel, and loves spending time with her family (who all live in Edmond), especially the four who call her Aunt Tracy.

A Few Words About Ordered Ministry – In November, you elected 3 new elders and 2 deacons, who will participate in officer training, be examined by the session, and be ordained and installed during worship early in 2011. Under our new Form of Government, The term 'church officer' has been replaced by 'ordered ministries.' The ordered ministries of deacon and elder "are gifts to the church to order its life so that the ministry of the whole people of God may flourish." (G-2.0102, Book of Order)

"Standards for ordained service reflect the church's desire to submit joyfully to the Lordship of Jesus Christ in all aspects of life (F-1.02). The council responsible for ordination and/or installation (G-2.0402; G-2.0607; G-3.0306) shall examine each candidate's calling, gifts, preparation, and suitability for the responsibilities of office. The examination shall include, but not be limited to, a determination of the candidate's ability and commitment to fulfill all requirements as expressed in the constitutional questions for ordination and installation (W-4.4003). Councils shall be guided by Scripture and the confessions in applying standards to individual candidates." (G-2.0104b, Book of Order)

Deacon: "The ministry of deacon as set forth in Scripture is one of compassion, witness, and service, sharing in the redeeming love of Jesus Christ for the poor, hungry, sick, lost, friendless, oppressed, those burdened by unjust policies, or anyone in distress. Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, sincere compassion, and sound judgment should be chosen for this ministry." (G-2.0201, Book of Order) The deacons of Memorial Presbyterian Church provide for congregational care and congregational fellowship as well as resources to support outreach ministries in Norman.

Ruling Elder: "Congregations should elect persons of wisdom and maturity of faith, having demonstrated skills in leadership and being compassionate in spirit. Ruling elders are so named not because they 'lord it over' the congregation, but because they are chosen by the congregation to discern and measure its fidelity to the Word of God, and to strengthen and nurture its faith and life. Ruling elders (the session), together with teaching elders (the pastor), exercise leadership, government, spiritual discernment, and discipline and have responsibilities for the life of a congregation as well as the whole church, including ecumenical relationships." (G-2.0301, Book of Order) The elders of Memorial Presbyterian Church are its spiritual leaders and meet regularly to discern the will of Christ for the church. They serve on standing committees (Building and Grounds, Christian Education, Mission and Evangelism, Nominating, Stewardship and Finance, and Worship and Music) and serve as presbytery elder commissioners and committee members.

Waiting to blossom


