


This book will be displayed in the Library throughout the month of November, and will be available to borrow.

Glory to God!

Session has given your Worship and Music committee permission to raise funds for new hymnals and pew Bibles. After discussion, study, and attending a workshop on the new PC(USA) hymnal, *Glory to God*, to be published in the fall of 2013, the committee decided to replace the twenty-year-old hymnals with one which includes contemporary, traditional, and multicultural hymns, and returns some old favorites that were left out of the blue hymnal. At the same time, we want to update the pew Bibles to a newer translation, the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV). We want you, the congregation, to have the opportunity to purchase hymnals or Bibles in honor or memory of a friend or family member. Hymnals ordered before June 1, 2013 will cost \$17.50, which includes the cost of imprinting the church name on the cover. Bibles will run about \$10-12 but as of this writing we do not know the cost of imprinting. We will also be ordering some large print copies of both. Large print hymnals are \$27.50 with imprinting. Watch for more details on how to order hymnals, or Bibles ... or both!

Mission & Evangelism Report

Ted Crump's Mission

Ted Crump is the first full time missionary to work for the All4Jesus Foundation out of Atlanta, GA. The All4Jesus Foundation is a nonprofit foundation with a married couple as directors along with a board of advisers.

Ted Crump is Janice Crump's grandson. He was born and raised in Tulsa and graduated from Jenks High School where he started as an offensive guard on the football team. He went from there to the Air Force Academy where he played football for 4 years and graduated from the Academy in 2007. Since he had to serve 5 yrs. of active duty, he became an intelligence officer and was promoted to Captain the last year he served. He resigned from the Air Force the middle of July of this year because he felt strongly that God was calling him to go to Swaziland, in the region of southern Africa, to help care for the orphaned children there.

As Swaziland's life expectancy drastically decreases due to AIDS, the number of orphans is skyrocketing. All4Jesus' vision is to build a loving home under the direction of God to holistically care for orphans and raise them as their very own. Since his arrival on October 1, Ted has been living at Pasteur Valley Children's Home where he has stayed twice before. During this time, his focus will be to learn as much as he can about Swaziland, adjust to life in Africa and create a strong bond with the owners of Pasteur Valley, on whom he will be able to depend during his time there. After a month long acclimation period, he will move off of their farm



and begin paving the way for All4Jesus' permanent settlement in Swaziland. His focus, while continuing to remain on the children, will branch out to the acquisition of property for All4Jesus' mission. Once locations have been selected for the Children's Home and the Community Care Center, construction will begin on each. The Children's Home will be where the house mothers and orphans will reside and the Community Care Center will be used to provide food, clothes and education (both traditional and Biblical) for the destitute children living in the local area. It is All4Jesus' desire and God's command to empower the Swazi people by encouraging them to use their talents, gifts and resources to build up and care for their own community; ultimately moving them closer to God's design and purpose for their lives.

Please partner with Ted in prayer so that God's will may be done in Swaziland and His children there will be blessed. — Janice Crump

Worship & Music Committee Report November, 2012

WORSHIP PLANNING

Did you ever wonder what goes into planning a worship service? If you are like me, it never crossed my mind until I joined the Worship and Music Committee, and even then it took a few years before I started feeling comfortable giving my "two-cents worth".

Let me give you a look into our most recent planning session held October 15 to plan an All Saints Day service.

First, we had to decide whether to hold the service **on** All Saints Day, a Thursday, or wait until the following Sunday and combine an All Saints Day observance with the celebration of communion. We opted for Sunday, November 4.

Second, we discussed what tone we wanted to pursue and determined a tone of celebration.

We looked at the lectionary scriptures for All Saints Day. Terry agreed to arrange to have a cantor for Psalm 24. It was decided to include Hebrews 11:32 – 12:3 as it refers to a cloud of witnesses.

Sometimes we follow the regular order of worship and sometimes we make changes. This time we agreed to follow the regular order and use a Call to Worship appropriate for All Saints Day. Many committee members had researched worship services online. After sharing ideas for prayers, hymns, communion, how to provide the congregation an opportunity to honor family and friends, etc., we slowly, but surely, built the service.

Joan traditionally takes her notes and types up a rough draft of the service, using a template that she has on her computer which matches the template that Terry has at church. She then submits the draft to the committee for review. It is at this point that Vince and Terry add the music portions if they have not previously done so.

So, that is it in a nutshell. It is a very amiable committee and we mix laughter with serious work.

Any and all are welcome to join us. We'll be planning Advent on Nov. 4 at 6:30 pm.

CHORISTERS' CORNER



Memorial on the Web

Have you seen our new website? If not, go to memorialpres.org to check it out. I can wait . . .

Why make a new website? The most important function of a church website is to give first-time visitors a good impression of the church, as well as lots of information about it. Visitors want to know many things about a church, such as:

- Service times
- Style of worship (i.e., traditional or contemporary; liturgical or nonliturgical; casual or formal)
- Nursery care availability and security policies
- Location and driving directions, as well as contact info
- A brief statement of what we believe (without too many details)
- What ministries are offered, especially those for youth and children
- How the church engages in mission and outreach
- How the church helps members connect with each other, and grow in their faith

Besides giving out important information, a church website should be attractively designed and easy to use. Beautiful design is not the *purpose* of a church website, but first impressions do matter: if visitors find the site ugly or amateurish, or if the design of the site is more of a hindrance than a help, they won't stay long and may never come back.

A good website can also serve our members in various ways. For example, ours now has an interactive web calendar that offers an attractive design, as well as more functionality than the old calendar. For one thing, by clicking the down arrow in the top right corner, you can select which categories of events you see. You can also get more information about many events by clicking on the event title. Would you like to request that an event be added? Fill out a simple form to notify the church office of your request.

A website can also be a useful tool for getting the word out, and we are now posting announcements, news items, and such, as they arise. If you would like, you may choose to be notified when new posts are put up, or get a daily or weekly email digest of news posts: simply enter a comment on any page, and follow the instructions. If you have news to share, don't be shy — send it in and we will let the world (wide web) know about it!

A website by its nature is always a work in progress. We need—and we welcome—your constructive criticism: please take a few minutes this month to review our site and find at least one thing you like or dislike, at least one thing you would add or remove, and let us know. We do not promise to implement all the ideas we receive, but we do promise to listen and carefully consider them.

It is our hope to develop a team approach to maintaining our new website. Each member has something to contribute: are you good with graphic design? We could use your help. Are you a good photographer or good with video (shooting and/or editing)? Good quality photos and videos can make a website more attractive and more useful. Don't have any relevant skills? No problem – you can help, by way of example, by sending us a news item to publish or by pointing out areas needing improvement. With your help, and your active participation, our website can become a means of outreach and community-building.

Thursday, November 8, 2012 at 7 PM: Addiction Recovery: Finding Serenity

Our guest speaker Bill Hanks is in recovery and has written a book entitled, *Serenity: It's a God Deal*. You will leave the meeting with a much better knowledge of why addicts do the things they do. Bill takes you through the evolution of addiction—from recreational use, to abuse, then to a mental and physical dependence, which, in the end, spirals into full-blown addiction—all the while using his own life story as an example. This will be an ideal talk for parents and grandparents who are dealing with addiction issues.

Bill Hanks is a recently retired 25-year veteran of Wall Street, having spent the last 11 years as cofounder/co-manager of an investment advisory firm in Tulsa. In 1996, Bill recognized his problem with drugs and alcohol, and checked himself into a treatment center. It was a decision that led him to teaching, in a volunteer capacity, weekly classes on recovery at the rehab center that helped him to help himself 16 years ago. Today, he has personally provided Twelve-Step based support and teachings to more than 11,000 patients and individuals in recovery. He also brings his "awareness programs" to churches and schools to help educate our susceptible youth and young adults as to the dangers of drug and alcohol use. His motto: "I would rather deploy 'prevention factors' now versus 'damage control' later."

Thursday, December 13, 2012 at 7 PM: The Family Component of Recovery

Rob's Ranch Program Director Brent Katigan will be our guest speaker. His inpatient facility for men located in Purcell recognizes that addiction is very much a family disease that affects the alcoholic/drug addict's loved ones. Rob's Ranch emphasizes family recovery where all who are impacted are encouraged to work together to reconcile and heal. Our meeting's discussion will center on the critical role family dynamics plays in recovery as well as prevention. Stemming from his own personal experience as well as a professional background that spans nearly three decades, Mr. Katigan will share strategies for identifying and treating unhealthy family systems in support of a loved one's recovery.

Parents Helping Parents is a network of parents and others concerned about alcohol/ substance abuse among our young people (both adolescents and adult children). The group offers hope through shared experience, resources, and education. They promote prevention and intervention, collaborative efforts and increased access to information/ services, and support. 


