Dear Friends,

What are you waiting for? The children are counting down the days to Christmas...how much longer? How much longer 'til we get there? How much longer will we be here? How much longer do I have to wait?

Advent, by definition, is a season about that which is "to come." We await the coming Messiah's birth. That may be well and good, but what about our day-to-day waiting? Waiting in those lines at the check-out. Waiting on our guests to arrive. Waiting for this day to be over. Some of us wait patiently; others are not so skilled in the practice. I find myself in both categories, how about you?

What are you waiting for this Advent, whether patiently or not? Are you waiting for certainty, for healing, for love, for approval? Are you waiting for recognition, for retirement, for enough money to simply pay the bills? Are you waiting for peace on earth, good will toward all? Are you waiting for a child to grow up, a spouse to settle down, a friend to call, an enemy to be prevented from calling? Are you waiting for God's kingdom to come?

For wherever eyes blind to the beauty and goodness of God are opened, God's kingdom has come.

God's kingdom has come.


Whenever those who feel like they have no reason to live, whenever the discouraged and those without hope hear the good news, God's kingdom has come.¹

Blessings to you this Advent and Christmas. Tracy



The book of the month for December is *Christianity After Religion:* The End of Church and the Birth of a New Spiritual Awakening. The author is Diana Butler Bass, who is a regular commentator on religion, politics, and culture for Time, The Washington Post, and NPR. She has written several titles, including *Christianity for the Rest of Us.* In *Christianity After Religion*, she offers a fresh interpretation of the "spiritual, but not religious, trend." Offering direction and hope to individuals and churches, *Christianity After Religion* is Bass's call to approach faith with a newfound freedom that is both life giving and service driven. She argues that we are at a critical stage in a new spiritual awakening.

Christmas Joy Offering

We will receive the Christmas Joy Offering on December 23. You are encouraged to give at any time during the seasons of Advent and Christmas.

What is the Christmas Joy Offering?

"For more than 70 years, Presbyterians have given generously at Christmas to support the unmet needs of families who have devoted their lives to the mission of the PC(USA). Today this Offering is shared equally by the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions, which provides critical assistance to Presbyterian church workers and their families, and Presbyterian-affiliated racial ethnic schools and colleges, which enable students to develop their gifts and find their calling. The Offering dates back to the 1930s, when the former Presbyterian Church in the United States began an offering to supplement inadequate retirement income and provide supplemental medical insurance for former ministers, missionaries, church workers, and their families.

"Although its roots trace back many years, this special offering remains just as essential today. Equally important to the financial help provided is the spiritual benefit received. Again and again, the individuals and families helped by the Offering say that as crucial as the financial

assistance is, what really sustains them is the knowledge that the church is standing with them in their time of need."

Stewardship Report — Percentage Living

During the last four Sundays Memorial has been introduced to the exciting concept of "Percentage Living". Each Sunday a bulletin insert described this concept from a slightly different perspective. First we learned how to practice percentage living by giving God a portion of each day. Next, we looked at giving God our Worship. The third Sunday we examined how Christ touches others through the Holy Spirit's activation of our individual spiritual gifts. And finally, we learned that we honor God and his creation when we give to God, through Memorial, from our monetary resources.

The message for the first two Sundays was focused on us as individuals, building us up in preparation for service. The third message showed how God's spirit works in and through us to reach and meet the needs of others. And, again the final message showed the importance of completing God's work by providing the financial base which permits, Memorial specifically, and the worldwide church in general, to support and advance God's mission and will.

Percentage Living is not new. The Apostle Paul introduced this concept with his description of Macedonian Christians in his second letter to the Corinthians. "We want you to know, brothers and sisters, about the grace of God that has been granted to the churches of Macedonia; for during a severe ordeal of affliction, their abundant joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part. For, as I can testify, they voluntarily gave according to their means, and even beyond their means, begging us earnestly for the privilege of sharing in this ministry to the saints-and this, not merely as we expected; they gave themselves first to the Lord and, by the will of God, to us..."

Percentage living is therefore giving ourselves—first to God and second to others. Many of you have turned in your pledges for 2013. If you have not done so, please open your hearts and minds to the concept of percentage living and seek God's direction in deciding how much to give. If we—like the Macedonian Christians—first give ourselves to God and then to others, will not God make it possible for us to give generously of our financial means in support of his work here at Memorial?

Yes, with God, all things are possible. Thank you for being a part of the Memorial family, thank you for your percentage living and thank you for being open to the limitless possibilities of God.

Worship & Music Committee Report

About every 20 years, most denominations publish a new hymnal. The PC(USA) is no exception: our last three hymnals were published in 1955, 1972, and 1990. New hymnals are published in response to changes in worship patterns, societal changes, and real-world experience with the existing hymnals — not every hymn in the current hymnal is beloved, after all!

In September 2013, the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation will publish a new Presbyterian hymnal, titled *Glory to God*. This new hymnal will include about 380 hymns from the current hymnal, including most of those that we enjoy singing regularly. It will also include many "new" hymns: some hundreds of years old, others written in the past few years. It will feature more gospel-style hymns and African-American spirituals: examples include *I Love to Tell the Story; Keep Your Lamps Trimmed and Burning; Shall We Gather at the River; Swing Low, Sweet Chariot*; and *His Eye Is on the Sparrow*. Just as the church in North America has increased its emphasis on unity with Christians of every land through such celebrations as World Communion Sunday, so the editors of *Glory to God* sought to include a more diverse selection of songs from throughout the world: from Peru and Korea, Pakistan and Cameroon, and all over this wide world. New offerings from contemporary hymn writers address modern concerns, while a selection of Praise & Worship-style songs reflect the diversity of church music in modern America. The great diversity of offerings is one of the major strengths of this new hymnal.


If you have attended worship at Memorial in the past three months, you may already have experienced some of the new, *and* some of the familiar, hymns in *Glory to God*. We have sung a Peruvian song of response to forgiveness, a contemporary hymn from a writer in New Zealand addressing issues of social justice, gospel songs that some may remember from many years ago, and hymns from past centuries and diverse traditions, now brought into the Presbyterian circle by the diligent work of the hymnal committee.

Following extensive study and discussion, the Worship and Music committee recommended—and the Session approved—purchasing new hymnals as well as new pew Bibles in the New Revised Standard Version. The hymnals will come with a purple cover (see page 8), similar to the front cover of the sampler we have been using in worship. We are still evaluating our options with respect to which Bible to order.

In order that each worshiper may find a hymnal within reach, no matter where she may be sitting, we need to buy 220 hymnals to place in the pews and for the choir, as well as 10 copies of the large-print edition, for the benefit of those whose eyesight isn't what it used to be. We estimate the total cost for the hymnals at \$4,125—\$4,355, some of which anonymous donors have already offered to pay. We will also need about 50 or 60 pew Bibles.

To take advantage of discounts extended to early adopters, we plan to order, and pay for, as many as possible of the hymnals we need before December 31, and the rest before June 1, 2013. Doing so will hold down the price of most of the hymnals and Bibles to \$17.50 (large print Hymnals will be \$27.50). After December 31, the prices will increase to \$18.50 and \$28.50 respectively.

We want you, the congregation, to have the opportunity to purchase hymnals and/or Bibles in honor of, or in memory of, a friend or family member. A table with order forms will be set up in the narthex on Sundays during Advent. We encourage you to submit orders for hymnals by Dec. 30, so that the order form can be mailed on Dec. 31. This will allow us to take advantage of an offer for free shipping. We will continue to accept orders after New Year's Day. — Terry Cast

About 2000 years ago there was a very special baby born in the town of Bethlehem.


