From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends,

It may seem odd to some, but I really look forward to Lent. There is something about a season that accepts and honors our repentance, our reflecting on where we fall short in our life's journey as a Christian, and our efforts to follow a truer path of faith, that brings me comfort. I find that a true Lenten time allows an even better celebration once we get to Easter!

Lent begins this year on February 13th. We will gather for a worship service on Ash Wednesday as together we mark ourselves as ones in need of repentance. This literal sign of ashes on our foreheads will remind us that we need God and one another in our humanness. The service will be at 7:00 and will be less than an hour in length.

Many people like to give up something for Lent. If that is your practice, or you would like to try it this year, please do so! I have known people to give up soda, meat, chocolate and Facebook. One friend is going to focus on being a nicer person.

I regularly recommend a practice of *adding* something to your days, such as a Lenten devotion, Bible reading or a time of prayer. Maybe a service project or committing to Sunday School would be something that would help you in your journey.

My rule of thumb is that if you can say it brings you closer to God, then it's probably a good option for a Lenten discipline.

I will be doing something that is both adding and giving up. Each day I am adding a time of silence to my time at home. I am making a commitment to turning off the TV, the computer and my phone every day for a specified time (probably for 30 minutes...I'm still negotiating with myself about this). For me, I know this will be a challenge because it is not my usual way of living, but I can also see what a benefit it will be, too. I tend to want to have distractions around; this will allow me time to really see what is happening in my life.

Here's the thing, though. There may be times that I am unhappy about my decision. Times I wish I could just forget about it and go back to my previous ways. Because I have made a commitment, though, I will keep at it, valuing the process even in my selfish attitude. And I can't go back, really, because what I have done — even for a few days — will have changed me. Even if it is just a little, one little step in the right direction gives me just a glimpse of those steps ahead.

Not all of us will choose to observe a Lenten discipline, and this is a good thing, too. There is a time for everything.

May you be blessed in this Lenten season, however you choose to participate. Tracy

Adult Sunday School Class to Begin New Series

The regular adult church school class, which meets in the parlor on Sunday mornings from 9:30 to 10:30, will embark on a new series beginning February 10. The series will coincide with Lent, and conclude on Palm Sunday, March 24. The class will consider portions of a video series, *Events that Changed History* (or, to be precise, people involved in those events). For seven Sundays we will view video lectures by the late Dr. Rufus Fears on a variety of subjects. The titles of the lectures will be: Moses and Monotheism; The Enlightenment of Buddha; Jesus—The Trial of a Teacher; Constantine I Wins a Battle; Muhammad Moves to Medina; Michelangelo Accepts a Commission; and Luther's New Course Changes History. Come, join the class for great information and interesting discussion on how these religious events have impacted our world.

A New Adult Sunday School Class Begins

Starting Sunday, February 10, a new adult class will begin to meet. It will be a study of *Listening for God: Volume 2*, and will meet for eight consecutive weeks (excluding Easter Sunday). *Listening for God* is made up of the writings of eight contemporary American writers who, in one way or another, make God, religious devotion, theological enigma, or religious experience central to their writing. Each chapter is about 10-15 pages. Volume one was the subject of a weeknight class this past fall. The new class will be discussion-centered, relying on the insights individual members bring in relation to their experience with the writers. There will also be a short video presentation which will give author profiles, and interviews with selected writers. The class will meet in the Library from 9:30 to 10:30.


2013 Lenten Study

Sundays, February 17 – March 24 7:00-8:00 p.m.

Are there positive virtues in the seven deadly sins? Perhaps not, but there are vital, life-affirming attributes in their opposites. Just as every cloud has a silver lining, every vice has a corresponding virtue, according to Dr. Robin Meyers, minister at Mayflower Congregational Church in Oklahoma City and author of *The Virtue in the Vice: Finding Seven Lively Virtues in the Seven Deadly Sins*, the subject of our study. Meyers writes, "Embedded in the worst of things is a remnant of the best of things." Meyer's thoughtful analysis is broad in range, dealing not only with personal virtue and vice, but also with the war on terror and the superficiality of American pop culture. If you are looking for a delightful, yet challenging book for the six weeks of Lent this study is for you. The book will cost \$10, and will be available from Tracy Evans a week before our starting date. The study is a joint venture with First Presbyterian Church of Norman and FPC's associate pastor, Rev. Pam Normile, will be co-teaching. Each class will be held at First Presbyterian Church.

Book of the Month

The Rev. Mr. Paul M. Burns grew up in Memorial Presbyterian Church, and he is currently pastor of Priest Lake Presbyterian Church in Nashville, Tennessee. He has recently published a book about prayer—*Prayer Encounters: Changing the World One Prayer at a Time*. This insightful book uses stories, reflections, questions to consider, and prayer challenges to show how individuals can bring people into direct spiritual contact with Jesus Christ by offering prayer in the moment to those who need it. It connects intercessory prayer with real-life situations. Rev. Burns will be speaking at Memorial on February 1st about his book. We will have some copies of the book for sale. 2013 Presbyterian Youth Triennium "I AM"

Memorial Presbyterian Church is proud to announce that three of our youth have been selected to attend the 2013 Presbyterian Youth Triennium that will be held July 15-21 at Purdue University. They are: Breanna Upton, A. J. Roesel and Elvira Sama.

You may ask.... What is Triennium? Think of it as youth camp on steroids, held every three years. Entering freshmen through graduating seniors in high school are eligible to attend. The event is sponsored by the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the Cumberland Presbyterian Churches (CPC and CPCA) for the purpose of gathering Presbyterian and Reformed young people from all over the United States and the world for worship, prayer, play, and mission experiences. It is estimated that about 4,000 youth will attend this incredible event this year.

At Triennium, it is believed that young people are prime carriers of the hope Christians are called to possess and share. The event is planned around a central theme and each day there is a sub-theme and supporting scriptures, speakers, conversations and mission opportunities. The goal is to offer an experience that provides youth with the opportunity to explore their faith and their practices alongside those of the past and present faith communities.

This year's theme is to explore the "I AM" statements of Jesus, as shared with disciples and the early followers of Jesus. Youth will look at the deep connection between the divine "I AM" and the human "I AM". Bill Buchanan, co-coordinator for the Triennium worship team stated, "We want young Christians to explore the nature of God through Jesus Christ. As they wrestle with their sense of God and self in today's world, we hope they will hear God calling, "I AM with you, preparing a place and path for you to be my eyes, hands, and feet in the world."

The cost of attending Triennium is \$900 per youth. The Indian Nations Presbytery will cover approximately \$400 of this for travel and lodging which leaves our candidates, Breanna, A.J. and Elvira to pay the balance of \$500 each. We want to help make this opportunity possible for Memorial's Triennium candidates by holding four fundraisers.

The first fundraiser will be a Soup & Salad Lunch after the worship service on February 3. The next fundraiser will be a Spaghetti Dinner & Silent Auction in March. We will be looking for donation items to be auctioned off. In April we are considering having a Church Yard Sale — as you do your spring cleaning, please keep this fundraiser in mind. We will also be looking for volunteers to help work this event.

The fourth fundraiser will be a Picnic Lunch in the courtyard after a worship service in June. Watch for dates and times as well as ways that you can contribute and help these youth reach their goal to attend Triennium 2013. Christian camps and retreats develop church leaders




