From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends,

Easter Blessings to you! In my preparation for Holy Week worship services, I came across this prayer. I share it with you as my prayer for this season.

Easter Prayer: Joy Comes in the Morning

Weeping comes for a night, but joy comes in the morning, O God of power and might.

Death has been defeated and we shout Alleluia!

Let all that we do today be a prayer of praise.

For many of us, it is an Easter just like the others, with Easter bonnets and Sunday best, with the ringing of bells and hymns of joy, with the preparing of meals and gathering around tables and hunting for eggs...

But let this be an Easter like no other. Let us see and hear with resurrection eyes and ears.

Let us discern signs of new life in the usual places—a new baby, the beauty of nature; and in unusual places... who knows where we might find you if we but look?

It is daunting to be resurrection people even as we read and watch the news—news of continued violence, poverty, suffering and despair.

We drink in these stories with our morning coffee, day after day, and wonder where the Easter's gone.

One year ago we celebrated your resurrection, and it seems little has changed in our world since then—Easter seems an idle tale in the wake of lives destroyed by war, children abused, a creation spoiled, and endless bickering among our leaders—too much hand-wringing and too little willingness to do the difficult things.

Close to home, we know loved ones who have felt the sting of death in their families; people who struggle to survive the loss of a job, people entombed by depression or a crippling illness.

Yes, resurrection eyes are not blind to pain. Resurrection ears are not deaf to cries of suffering.

But resurrection people see your goodness that outlasts and overpowers any darkness we can experience or concoct.

Easter is the climax of the story, but not the end. You alone can roll away the stone, but we are called to run, and tell:

> "We have seen the Lord! Come and follow! Believe, and live!"

If we don't, who will?
Resurrect us, O God of new life—resurrect us from our complacency and fear.
You have the power to do it.¹

The next regular meeting of Session will be Tuesday, April 16, 2013 at 7PM.





In a Severe State Drought:

Faith Communities Called Upon to Pray for Rain AND to Conserve Water

The Oklahoma Conference of Churches (OCC) is calling upon Memorial Presbyterian Church and other faith communities to pray for rain AND to take steps to conserve water during a time of the severest drought in over 50 years. According to weather experts, 95% of Oklahoma is experiencing extreme drought, including Norman.

OCC is calling on Oklahomans of all Faiths to come together for a series of Interfaith Days of Prayer for Rain. The series will be launched at the State Capitol on Earth Day, April 22, 2013 (start time TBA). Other Days of Prayer for Rain are scheduled for June 26 and September 18.

Norman has instituted Mandatory Water Conservation beginning January 14, 2013. The action was taken in particular because of a shortage of water in Lake Thunderbird. Currently, Lake Thunderbird is 7 ½ feet below normal. Some 2/3 of Norman's water supply comes from Lake Thunderbird. Because of the ongoing drought conditions, lake officials have imposed a mandatory 10% reduction in the water Norman can receive from the lake.

Most water usage is in outdoor watering, bathroom uses, clothes washing, etc. Under Norman's required Water Conservation, the following restrictions apply. Fines up to \$750 per violation can be imposed.

Norman Residential Restrictions

All outdoor watering or irrigation is prohibited between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M.

Odd/Even water restrictions (house addresses that end with an even number water on even numbered calendar days; house addresses that end with an odd number water on odd number calendar days) for irrigation purposes are required for all customers with NO watering on Wednesday and Thursday of each week. The 31st day of the month is not included in the odd/even water rotation, but conservation is urged.

Hand watering gardens/plants/shrubs with a hose is allowed at any time.

Excess water run-off from any landscaped area onto streets is prohibited whether by design, maladjustment to sprinkler system, or usage during high winds.

Washing of cars, trucks, trailers or other vehicles is prohibited unless these items are taken to a commercial carwash.

Washing or hosing down of buildings, sidewalks, driveways, patios, porches, parking areas or any paved surface is prohibited.

Some Conservation Tips from the City of Norman

<u>Outdoor</u>

Install rain gauges and freeze gauges on irrigation systems to prevent watering when it is not necessary.

Watering the lawn and garden is more efficient in the early morning or at night when the sun won't cause as much evaporation. Avoid sprinklers with fine mists, they increase evaporation.

Keep the grass two to three inches long to enhance root development with minimal watering.

Wash your car with soap and a bucket. Washing your car with a running hose uses more than 100 gallons of water. Using a bucket & sponge cuts this by 90%.

Pay careful attention to sprinklers to prevent water getting on driveways, streets and sidewalks where it is wasted.

Use mulch in gardens to minimize weed growth, slow erosion and slow evaporative losses.

Check for leaks in pipes, hoses, faucets, couplings and lawn sprinkler systems and repair immediately. Even a small drip can waste hundreds of gallons of water a day.

Indoors

Install low flow showerheads. They are easy to install and save water and energy.

Install low flush toilets or install a toilet tank displacement insert or dam to reduce the volume of water in the tank and the amount used per flush. A plastic jug filled with water and placed in the tank is an effective displacement device.

Check for leaks inside toilets. Leaks inside the toilet can waste up to 200 gallons of water a day. Toilet leaks can be detected by adding a few drops of food coloring to water in the toilet tank. If the colored water appears in the bowl, the toilet is leaking.

Never use the toilet as a wastebasket.

Operate the dishwasher and washing machines only when completely full.

Don't let the faucet run needlessly when brushing your teeth or shaving.
