# From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends,

It was Monday morning, and I got a call from the church. Terry called to tell me that the TV was missing from the Fellowship Hall. Norman police were quick to respond, and we soon found the thief (or thieves) had been in my office and the church office, too, and we discovered more missing items.

Skip to Tuesday, and I'm on-line, checking out a charge on my credit card. I notice a charge to a place I haven't been to in quite some time, and then realize that my card number had been compromised and there were some \$6800 in charges made in the previous week (and for the record, I have the card in my possession).

Both of these events made me feel vulnerable.

Learning that someone that I didn't know had been through my desk, and took some things of mine. Knowing that my own credit card account had been abused.

Now, both of these things were rectified; we found all the stolen items in our storage shed (really?), and I'm not responsible for any of the credit card charges.

As I reflected on my feelings of vulnerability, it occurred to me that though these situations were negative, vulnerability can be a positive feeling, too.

Vulnerability is a funny thing. We are vulnerable when we are in a position of weakness. Since our society seems to put such a value on strength, it may seem that weakness is something to be avoided. But we need to remember that we are called to follow the one who intentionally became human—took on weakness—in order to save us. God sent Jesus on our behalf.

The vulnerability I felt this week reminded me of what I deem important in my life. I could look at my personal possessions that had been taken and decide if losing them was worth energy and anxiety (they weren't). My credit card situation reminded me of how much I have been given and that I am called to be a steward of my resources.

I hope you'll take a few minutes to look at what is most important to you, and even to find that vulnerability can be a welcome feeling.

Although veterans make up only 7 percent of the U.S. population, they account for an alarming 20 percent of all suicides. And though treatment of post-traumatic stress disorder has undoubtedly alleviated suffering and allowed many service members returning from combat to transition to civilian life, the suicide rate for veterans under thirty has been increasing. Research by Veterans Administration health professionals and veterans' own experiences now suggest an ancient but unaddressed wound of war may be a factor: moral injury. This deep-seated sense of transgression includes feelings of shame, grief, meaninglessness, and remorse from having violated core moral beliefs.
