# From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends,

In this busy time of year (really, though, when are we not busy?), I often need to make myself stop and remember that we are in Lent. We are on the road to Easter.

As I visit with folks both in and out of our congregation, I am privileged to be in conversations that include disclosures of pain and hurt. Some of us are open with our concerns; others are reticent to disclose them. Regardless, we all have some sense of pain that we would rather not have.

In a recent sermon, I used a saying I ran across in my sermon preparation. "The road to Easter runs through a cemetery." I am reminded of this when I hear sadness or anxiety or worry.

We are on the road to Easter.

Arthur Schopenhauer said, "Every parting gives a foretaste of death; every coming together again a foretaste of the resurrection.

We are an Easter people. We live as those who know that death (or pain or suffering) does not have the final say. It is why we gather each Sunday, as we give powerful testimony to the truth of the resurrection.

On Easter Sunday, we will gather once again and celebrate in beautiful and meaningful ways the joyful truth that we worship a God who loves us enough (more than we can even imagine) to send God's very Son to be one of us, to know our sorrows as well as our joys, to know our very nature. It is this Son who died for us and who we worship as resurrected, living fully with God.

I look forward to worshiping with you on Easter, as I do each Sunday of the year.

Easter Egg Hunt Sunday, April 16 following the potluck! Donations of wrapped candy are welcome. Please bring to the church by Tuesday, April 11.




















#### **BEHIND THE SCENES**

Have you ever wondered who opens the church on Sunday mornings, or gets the sound system ready, or, for that matter, who changes the banners and cleans the baptismal font? There is a lot that goes on behind the scenes each Sunday morning to ready the sanctuary for worship.

Take the head usher, for example. (Yes. We have head ushers.) The head usher is usually responsible for a month of Sundays. His/her job includes turning on the lights in the sanctuary, checking the thermostat, checking the wicks in the candles on the communion table and by the cross, cleaning the font and hanging banners if necessary, serving as backup for the ushers, checking on the attendants in the nursery, and taking a head count of worshipers. After worship he/she pulls the attendance pages from the booklets, readjusts the thermostat, and turns off the sanctuary lights.

Mike and Joan Cole have been responsible for signing up head ushers **and** volunteers to run the sound system (more on that at another time), and we thank them immensely for the time and energy they spend at and for Memorial. We also thank those fearless volunteers who serve as head ushers and ushers. These are a few of the many who work behind the scenes at Memorial. Thanks be to God!

Dear Friends,

As you know, Indian Nations Presbytery is in a time of transition. We're working together to look at who we are as a presbytery, what we're called to do as a presbytery and what structures need to be in place to assure that we live out our identity and mission in a healthy way. We began that process at our February presbytery meeting by reflecting upon and discussing the roles within the presbytery; the rules within the presbytery; how we work on our differences; the emotional impact the presbytery has had on us and the stories associated with those stories; and anything else that we need to talk about at future times. The Transition Task Force and our consultant, David Sawyer, were introduced at that meeting and have been working together to facilitate more opportunities to gather data from everyone in the presbytery.

To that end, congregations around the presbytery have graciously agreed to host listening sessions, enabling the Transition Task Force to gather more data and hear your stories. We need everyone's voice as we move forward. Your input is valued and we need and want to hear from you! Please encourage your congregations to attend a nearby listening session. # COMFORT MY PEOPLE

#### FOCUS ON MENTAL HEALTH

#### **Early Warning Signs**

Not sure if you or someone you know is living with mental health problems? Experiencing one or more of the following feelings or behaviors can be an early warning sign of a problem:

- · Eating or sleeping too much or too little
- Pulling away from people and usual activities
- · Having low or no energy
- Feeling numb or like nothing matters
- · Having unexplained aches and pains
- · Feeling helpless or hopeless
- · Smoking, drinking, or using drugs more than usual
- Feeling unusually confused, forgetful, on edge, angry, upset, worried, or scared
  - · Yelling or fighting with family and friends
  - · Experiencing severe mood swings that cause problems in relationships
  - · Having persistent thoughts and memories you can't get out of your head
  - · Hearing voices or believing things that are not true
  - · Thinking of harming yourself or others
- Inability to perform daily tasks like taking care of your kids or getting to work or school

#### Give a small church the chance to nurture your children.

One of my missions is to challenge the assumption that small congregations have little or nothing to offer children. Here are some more thoughts about how a healthy, loving small church can be a great blessing to families with children. There are good reasons for choosing a small church for your children's sake. If you become involved with this kind of congregation,

- Your children will have a nurturing extended family of grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins who will truly be interested in them, encourage them, attend their sports events and performances, and celebrate their milestones. My daughter describes the senior generation at our church as her "grandfriends."
- Your children will learn how to follow Jesus from observing adult disciples of Jesus, knowing them well, and serving actively alongside them. For the rest of their lives, your children will remember these role models in faith.
- Your children's concerns will be taken very seriously. The pastor has time to spend with your children and can get to know each child personally.
- Your children's talents will be welcomed and appreciated. What better place, for example, for a young musician to make his or her debut than in the midst of the gracious circle of a small church?
- Through ongoing relationships, your children and older adults will enrich one another's lives and learn how to love and care faithfully for one another over the long haul of life.

I sometimes hear people say that they want their children to go to church with a large group of children. While it may be more exciting and more fun to be around a lot of children their own age, school, scouting, sports teams, and other programs meet that social need well. What is rare in today's society is the opportunity for different generations to mix and become one people in life and mission together. In today's world people of different ages and life stages are stratified and lead largely separate lives. They even live in separate communities. Congregations are often stratified in the same way. Intergenerational small congregations offer a much-needed alternative that challenges everyone—younger, older, and in-between—to love each other as neighbors.

If you are looking for a church for your family, don't just automatically drive past a small church. Stop in and take time to get to know the people. Give them a chance to bless you and your children. You may find that God has led you home.


