

Some months ago, the Session established a theme to help Memorial's congregation and various committees unify around a common focus. That theme, that target of focus is Mental Health. A task force, has been established to inform, guide, and assist in raising awareness of mental health issues and resources. The Task Force on Mental Health membership includes Harry Wright, Melissa Gill, Joan Cole, Michael Yeager, and Tracy Evans.

Through the efforts of many organizations and private citizens, the subject of Mental Heath, it's diagnosis and treatment, has gradually come out of the shadows. Unfortunately, stigma still clings to the label in spite of multitudes of sufferers and their families. Diagnosis and treatment has been hampered by societal attitudes that cause families to hide or cover for members who suffer mental or emotional maladies. Fear of losing jobs or friends results in sufferers refusing to seek help and self-medicate with alcohol and/or drugs.

Beginning with this newsletter, the Task Force on Mental Health will be publishing a series of facts, statistics, and statements from various resources to help in a greater understanding of mental health issues. Look for a section labeled "Comfort My People". This phrase is adopted from a policy study done for General Assembly in 2008. It uses the concept of exile for those with mental illness and in need of comfort.

FOCUS ON MENTAL HEALTH

Mental health includes our emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It affects how we think, feel, and act. It also helps determine how we handle stress, relate to others, and make choices. Mental health is important at every stage of life, from childhood and adolescence through adulthood.

Over the course of your life, if you experience mental health problems, your thinking, mood, and behavior could be affected. Many factors contribute to mental health problems, including:

- Biological factors, such as genes or brain chemistry
- Life experiences, such as trauma or abuse
- Family history of mental health problems

Mental health problems are common but help is available. People with mental health problems can get better and many recover completely.



The Parlor class is using video



From the course overview: Rightly recognized as one of the world's most important spiritual texts, the Bible has shaped thousands of years of faith, art, and human history. Yet for all its importance to believers and nonbelievers alike, we rarely engage with the Bible as a collection of unique narratives that were only later united into what we now know as the Old and New Testaments. And these different texts—historical narratives, dramatic visions, poems, songs, letters—speak to a broad range of experience, from joy and wonder to tragedy and mystery.



Reckless Faith-The Library class is reading and discussing this book together. From the publisher: "In a world where we tend to be over-cautious about, well, nearly everything, it's no surprise that our obsession with safety can carry over to how we live our faith in the world. But it's always been risky to follow God, and Kevin Harney believes we are missing a vital part of our faith when we play it safe.

"In this energizing book, he challenges readers to count the cost, take a chance, and live a reckless faith for the entire world to see. With a focus on "responsible recklessness,"" Harney shows readers how to develop a faith that others notice, always supported by prayer, wisdom, the direction of Scripture, and insightful counsel from other believers. He outlines how to be reckless in our love, generosity, service, relationships, prayers, and speech.

Forgiveness: A Lenten Study-This Sunday Evening book discussion is led by Pastor Tracy. From the publisher: "Forgiving others and humbly asking for forgiveness are central disciplines for all Christian believers. Lent, a time to reflect on our Christian journey, is an appropriate time to deepen our understanding and practice of forgiveness. Marjorie J. Thompson, author of the best-selling book *Soul Feast*, takes a close look at our understanding of forgiveness in this encouraging study. In six brief chapters, Thompson addresses such questions as the following:

- Is forgiveness a Christian duty under all circumstances? Or are there situations when Christians do not need to forgive?
- Is forgiveness a matter between individuals, or is it meaningful only in the context of communities?
- Is forgiving the best route to healing for the injured?
- How do we get past emotional barriers to real forgiveness?

Using biblical examples and real-life situations, Thompson illustrates each chapter's theme in an informative and engaging way. A study guide is also included at the back of the book that is appropriate for either individual reflection or group discussion. With clarity, insight, and sensitivity, this book is the perfect resource for examining both our ability to forgive and our own need for forgiveness.


